The Sermon On The Mount

(Matthew 5 - 7)

1.) The first of five major discourses in Matthew.

Each one ends with a phrase similar to "When Jesus had finished these words. . . "

(Matt. 7:28; 11:1; 13:53; 19:1; 26:1)

2.) Matthew 1 - 4 are preparatory.

Jesus prepares for His earthly ministry and is set forth as:

- * The son of David Mt. 1:1ff; II Sam. 7:12-16; Ps. 89
- * The son of Abraham Mt. 1:1; Gen. 12:3
- * The Son of God Mt. 1:20, 23; 3:17; Hos. 11:1
- King of the Jews Mt. 2:1-12; Ps. 89
- * Prophet/Teacher Mt. 4:17; Dt. 18:15; Isa. 9:1,2
- * These chapters also provide early testimony of John (3:1-17); The Father (3:17) and Jesus withstanding early temptations.
- 3.) Geographical setting Mt. 4:23; Isa. 9:12
- 4.) Audience 4:25; 5:1; 7:28
- 5.) Purpose
 - A. Purpose Is Not:
 - 1) The law of a Millennial Utopian earthly kingdom (Mt. 5:10)
 - 2) A discourse on the Law of Moses (4:23; 5:3,10,19,20; 6:10,33; 7:21)
 - 3) A discourse showing contrasts between the Law of Moses and the Gospel 5:43
 - 4) A plan of social reconstruction.
 - B. Purpose is:
 - 1) 4:17 "Repentance, for the kingdom of Heaven" was "at hand"
 - 2) 4:23 Proclaiming the "good news of the kingdom"
 - 3) 5:3 7:12 Jesus shows the character and blessedness of kingdom citizens.
 - 4) 7:13 27 Jesus exhorts us to enter the kingdom and warns of dangers along the way.
 - 5) 5:20,43 To correct misinterpretations and abuses of God's law
 The Scribes and Pharisees had drained the life and meaning from
 the Law. cp. 5:20 ff; 15:1-14; 23:1-28)
 - 6) 5:17 19 To set forth Jesus as the fulfillment of the Law
 - 7) 5:22,28,32,34,39,44; 7:28,29 To set forth the authority of Jesus
 - 8) 5:3 9 To set forth timeless truths and principles (the many principles taught in these chapters; humility, meekness, mercy, morality, purity of heart, honesty, etc. would apply in every Bible age)

6.) Outline of the Sermon

- A. The Sermon may be broken down into three main parts;
 - 1) The citizens of the kingdom (5:3 -16)
 - their character and blessedness (5:3-12)
 - their relation to the world (5:13 -16)
 - 2) The righteousness of the kingdom. (the standard of life demanded by the King. Not in totality but it's ethical core. (5:17 7:12))
 - true righteousness on the subject of hatred and violence (5:21-26)
 - true righteousness on the subject of morality (5:27-32)
 - true righteousness on the subject of honesty (5:33-37)
 - true righteousness in the treatment of our enemies (5:38-48)
 - true righteousness in motive (6:1-18)
 - true righteousness in our attitude toward money and material things (6:19-33)
 - true righteousness in our judgment of others (7:1-6)
 - true righteousness in our trust toward God (7:7-12)
 - 3) Exhortation to enter the kingdom (7:13-27)
